(TALIS), found that only in Finland, Singapore and Abu Dhabi did the majority of teachers feel their profession was valued in society. Incidentally Finland and Singapore are consistently top performers in international education comparison tests – coincidence?

It is worth remembering that you are able read this because of a teacher.

Weekly Reflection: "It is the supreme art of the teacher to awaken joy in creative expression

and knowledge" – Albert Einstein.

There are teachers who have a life-long impact on us by successfully guiding us through our education. We all remember the ones who got us through difficult times and helped us see things we couldn't quite see for ourselves. (Case in point – the recent Adele concert). "Train up a child in the way (s)he should go; even when (s)he is old (s)he will not depart from it **Proverbs 22:6.**
