### WEEKLY REFLECTION

### Sunday 27th April 2025: Second Sunday of Easter Marian Prayers: 1 The Ave Maria

How many times in our life have we prayed the Hail Mary? What is its history and significance? It evolved in sections over the centuries until reaching its present, authorised form as a prayer by 1568. The first real evidence of the phrases "*Ave Maria*" and "*benedicta tu in mulieribus*" is from the mid-11<sup>th</sup> century. In the British Museum are two Anglo-Saxon manuscripts, one of which possibly dates from about 1030 A.D. They show that the above phrases occurred throughout the Cursus of the Blessed Virgin, an office popular in the monasteries, though it is not clear whether the two phrases were united into a single, simple prayer until shortly afterwards. A monastic document from before 1184 shows that it had become customary to include also the words: "and blessed is the fruit of thy womb". So, by that date people were saying the first part of the prayer up to and including these words. It can be seen that this first section begins with the words of the Angel at the Annunciation, followed by the greeting of St Elizabeth to Our Lady at the Visitation.

The prayer further evolved by adding the Holy Name, "*Jesus Christus*", so that in the 13<sup>th</sup>-15<sup>th</sup> centuries the ending was: "and blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus *Christ, Amen*". It is documented that people in private prayer then began to add a petition, which often included an appeal for sinners and help at the hour of death, though this was neither uniform nor universal. In the late 15<sup>th</sup> century, a form similar to the present prayer was said to be the prayer of Pope Alexander VI, Rodrigo Borgia - a 'controversial' occupant of the Papacy to say the least! By 1514 the present-day version of the Ave Maria is found in the breviary of the Camaldolese monks in Italy. This version made its way into the Catechism of the Council of Trent, completed in 1564, and, shortly after, in 1568, it was officially recognised in the Roman Breviary.

The early 20<sup>th</sup> century Catholic Encyclopaedia, on which the information in this article is primarily based, relates two, somewhat unusual facts about the prayer. The first is that, although modern Catholic words are "<u>the</u>Lord is with thee", this is a relatively recent development. The more general custom in Victorian days was to say "<u>our</u> Lord is with thee". In the 19<sup>th</sup> century Cardinal Wiseman expressed strong disapproval of change to "<u>the</u>Lord is with thee", describing it as "stiff....and destructive of the unction which the prayer breathes". The second fact, as recorded in the Encyclopaedia just over a hundred years ago, is that in some places, and notably in Ireland, the feeling still survived that the Hail Mary was completed with the word 'Jesus'. The author had also been informed that within living memory it was not uncommon for Irish peasants, when required to say Hail Marys in penance, to ask whether they were required to say the Holy Marys too.

Finally, the modern Catechism of the Catholic Church (paras 2675-2676) says this about many hymns and prayers to Our Lady: "...two movements usually alternate with one another: the first "magnifies" the Lord for the "great things" he did for his lowly servant and through her for all human beings The second entrusts the supplications and praises of the children of God to the Mother of Jesus, because she now knows the humanity which, in her, the Son of God espoused. This twofold movement of prayer to Mary has found a privileged expression in the Ave Maria"
